# UNITED COUNCIL ON WELFARE FRAUD

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The last newsletter I posted referenced an upcoming trip to Washington, D.C., in February/March 2023. I have included an article about this trip in this quarter's newsletter.

On April 24, 2023, Dawn Royal and Andrew McClenahan met with Raquel Echeverria, FNS SNAP State Administration Branch,

Kathryn Fernandez, Muniyra Thompson, and Sophia Carlton of Accenture Federal Services for an interview regarding SNAP recipient fraud trends, emerging recipient fraud prevention, and detection tools and techniques. After this meeting, UCOWF was asked to complete a questionnaire titled FNS Assessment of SNAP Recipient Fraud Trends, which we are currently working on.

On May 24, 2023, Dawn Royal, Andrew McClenahan, Jana McDonough, and I met via videoconference with several of Senator Boozman's staff. In attendance was Katherine Thomas, Senior Professional Staff, Dr. John Newton, Chief Economist, Karen Fletcher, U.S. Department of Agriculture Legal Detail, and Kate Covington, Legislative Aid, Advisor on Nutrition Policies. During that time, we discussed several pitfalls in SNAP and how to strengthen program integrity, government accountability, and public trust.

UCOWF will be returning to Washington, D.C., where we were invited by Congressman Thompson's Office to testify before the House Agriculture Committee, focusing on the Chairman's four principles related to innovation, employment, integrity, and health, on June 7, 2023. Past UCOWF President, Dawn Royal will be representing UCOWF and will be participating in the integrity discussion regarding fraud, waste, and abuse in SNAP. Andrew McClenahan and I will be accompanying her in Washington, D.C. We will be meeting with other members of Congress to spread UCOWF's message that fraud in SNAP far exceeds the "less than 1%" promoted by FNS and bring to light, the largely unknown fact that USDA spends less than 1/20th of 1% of the SNAP budget on the prevention, detection, and prosecution of fraud.

## The United Council on Welfare Fraud Visits Washington DC



On February 27 and 28, 2023, I led a delegation of UCOWF leaders on our annual trip to Washington, D.C. to meet with US House of Representatives and Senate members and their staffs. The delegation consisted of past president Dawn Royal (WY), Directors Andrew McClenahan (FL) and Jana McDonough (NE), and me.

We met with US Representative Glenn Thompson (PA), <u>Chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture</u>, and his Senior Staff Director, Jennifer Tiller; John Altendorf, Legislative Assistant to US Representative Brad Finstad (MN) who serves as the Chairman of subcommittee on <u>Nutrition</u>,

<u>Foreign Agriculture and Horticulture</u>; and Katherine Thomas, Senior Professional Staff to US Senator John Boozman (AR), who serves as the Ranking Member of the Senate Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry Committee.

Our meetings revolved around program integrity and its impact on taxpayers and those for whom the programs were created to assist. We focused on providing information to the lawmakers and their staffs on three issues and offering ideas for change.

Our top priority was advocating for **increased state retention rates** for fraud and inadvertent household error recoveries and requiring those retained dollars to be earmarked exclusively for program integrity efforts. Currently, states can retain 35% of collections for fraud recoveries and 20% for household error collections and UCOWF is advocating for a return to the 2001 standard of 50% retention rate for both fraud and household error overpayment recoveries. In advocating for the rate increase and earmark, we presented data from FNS itself that reported in FY 2022, it spent one-twentieth of one percent of the SNAP budget on program integrity. With so little budget dedicated by FNS to prevention, detection, investigation, prosecution, and recovery of improper payments caused by fraud and error, our position to not only increase the retention rate for recoveries but also codifying those dollars to be exclusively used for program integrity received enthusiastic support from those with whom we met.

The second issue we addressed was the **National Accuracy Clearinghouse** (NAC) and FNS continual efforts to delay implementing the protection against duplicate participation in SNAP. We briefed the lawmakers and their staffs on the history of the NAC: the successful pilot program that was launched in 2013/2014, the Public Consulting Group (PCG) report written for FNS in 2015 which supported its implementation, the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018 in which Congress directed the FNS to implement NAC, and the 2020 Implementing Rule published by FNS in the Code of Federal

Regulations to implement it, and now, a new rule from FNS that completely undermines NAC and will delay its implementation until at least 2027.

UCOWF addressed the Interim CFR and the six year delay in a <a href="December 2022 letter to FNS">December 2022 letter to FNS</a>. FNS cites data privacy concerns and the potential for misidentification leading to application denials created by NAC as the basis for derailing its implementation and costing American taxpayers billions of dollars in duplicate payments by doing so. UCOWF leaders presented information that dispels the concerns FNS raised to justify delaying the NAC implementation and urged lawmakers to require FNS to implement NAC immediately.





The final issue UCOWF leaders shared with lawmakers involves the **EBT card skimming** and cloning problem that has exploded across the nation and creates a tremendous challenge for states to uncover, investigate, and stop. We stated that we were not aware of any proposals or preventative measures being taken by FNS and stressed the prevention is the best and most cost-effective measure in combatting fraud.

We discussed the various countermeasures being used by businesses to protect their point of sale (POS) terminals from devices used for skimming and countermeasures used by financial institutions nationwide to thwart credit card cloning. The commercial industry moved quickly to stem losses, but the FNS has been exceptionally slow to react to the mounting loss of tax dollars caused by identity thief account takeover, skimming, and cloning. UCOWF believes that the measures adopted by the private sector, if implemented by FNS would stop the incredible and avoidable loss of tax dollars to thieves and scammers. We urged the lawmakers to compel FNS and States to implement countermeasures currently employed by the private sector to block skimming and cloning, thus protecting the taxpayer and the less fortunate citizens among us who the program was created to assist. Funding is not an issue.



In all, it was an amazing opportunity to meet with impressive people who shape public policy and provide them with a different view of the effectiveness of safety net programs and how they are being administered. We left encouraged that our efforts would help improve program integrity in the future. Stronger program integrity equals better access to those who desperately need this program.
